

What does a _____ do?

Want to find out about a different job? Want to know what they do every day and if it's the right job for you?

O*NET (Occupational Network) will give you all you need to know about what a person does on the job. Here's how to find out:

1. Go to www.onetonline.org.
2. Find the "Search" box and put in the job you are interested in.
3. Look at the sections for "Tasks" and "Work Activities."

Here's an example for a Janitor:

Tasks

- Monitor building security and safety.
- Service, clean, or supply restrooms.
- Gather and empty trash.
- Clean building floors by sweeping, mopping, scrubbing, or vacuuming.
- Use chemical cleaners and power equipment.

Work Activities

- Inspecting Equipment, Structures, or Material
- Performing General Physical Activities
- Handling and Moving

What's a good job for me?

There are 5 steps to figuring out a good job:

1. Find out what you like to do (www.myskillsmyfuture.org)
2. Find out what job will let you do that (www.onetonline.org)
3. Find out if that job pays enough (www.scWorkforceonline.com, click on "Employment and Wage Data")
4. Make sure you have the training you need (www.scWorkforceonline.com, click on "Education and Training Data")
5. Search for that job (<https://jobs.scworks.org>)

Work ethic:

They want you to show up for work on time and dressed properly, be energetic about your job, and call in if you are not going to be able to get to work.

Speak and write correctly:

Talk clearly and don't mumble. Write so others can understand. Use complete sentences and the right punctuation.

Teamwork:

Be friendly when working with others. Make sure you pull your own weight when working in a team. Communicate with your teammates and try to get along with everyone.

Problem solving:

Be the person people go to for solving problems or finding answers. Use what you have to figure out and fix obstacles.

Do I need training?

Do you need training to get the right skills for a good job? Where can you get training? How much does it cost? How long will it take? Here's how to find the answers to these questions:

1. Go to www.scWorkforceInfo.com.
2. Go down to "Education and Training Data."
3. Click on "Training and Education Programs."
4. Pick the area where you want to get the training (a city, county, workforce area, or SC).
5. Type in a key word about the training you need. (Example: If you want to become a nurse, type in the key word "nursing.")
6. Click on the program name to see more details about the training, including how long it is and the cost. Programs that have "WIA" can be paid for by the government if you qualify.
7. Need to know more? Ask to talk to an SC Works team member about training.

HOW MUCH SHOULD I BE PAID?

Are you being paid the right amount?



◆ South Carolina does not have an official minimum wage but the minimum for the US is \$7.25.

◆ The 2015 average wage in SC is \$19.51/hour.

◆ The highest wage is in Charleston; the lowest in Myrtle Beach.

◆ The average pay based on how much education you have...

- Less than high school/GED: \$8.78
- HS/GED: \$12.35
- Some college or Associate's Degree: \$15.02
- Bachelor's Degree: \$20.99
- Masters & above: \$26.04
